- I. Welcome and Introductions
- II. Discussion Items
  - a. Members of the AIC should be aware of tools ISU has to promote integrity
    - i. TurnItIn – creating assignments
      1. Nancy Legge will create a video tutorial for the website ([isu.edu/aic](http://isu.edu/aic)) to assist faculty with creating assignments in Moodle using TurnItIn
    - ii. TurnItIn – similarity reports
      1. This feature matches content that has appeared previously online
    - iii. TurnItIn – AI reports
      1. Change of policy: this feature no longer reports if 20% or less of an assignment has used AI. This prevents ‘false positives’ and potential liability
      2. Be on the watch for ‘spinnners’ - websites that assist with paraphrasing AI-generated content so that it is hard to detect
    - iv. Refer colleagues to AIC for assistance in interpreting Turnitin data; ITRC can be consulted for technical issues regarding TurnItIn

1. Faculty need to be cautious regarding accusations of academic dishonesty - many tools are needed to monitor academic integrity. TurnItIn is not the only platform in use
2. It will require some practice and experience to use these tools correctly
- v. Nancy Legge will email AIC a tutorial on plagiarism, cheating, dishonesty and AI use

b. Reviews of AIC and ISUPP #4000

- i. Legge and Whitaker are rewriting ISUPP 400 to clarify wording, definitions, and procedure regarding academic integrity and dishonesty
- ii. AIC Members may be asked to serve on panels about academic dishonesty - if a student has multiple infractions, should they be suspended or expelled? Issues of academic integrity or scholastic appeals
- iii. Members may be asked to serve on panels about scholastic appeals (if a student appeals a final grade or a program dismissal and disagrees with the Dean's decision)
  1. This procedure used to be under the Dean of Students - AIC will now oversee this
  2. The only criterion to serve on the panel is that panel members can't be from the same department where the course is housed. Concerns about consistency across campus
- iv. Policy revision will emphasize how many faculty are on hearings and the number of student infractions necessary to trigger a hearing

c. Concerns about AI on campus

- i. Syllabus statements about Academic Integrity
  1. Faculty must include a statement on their syllabi regarding the acceptable use, or not, of AI
- ii. Syllabus statements about generative-AI platforms
- iii. Awareness of Grammarly's new reliance on AI
  1. Grammarly has become a more aggressive checking tool – now it suggests broader changes to the whole document structure
