WANT TO BE AN HONORS PEER MENTOR?

The application to be a 2025 Honors Peer Mentor is Now Open!

New Honors Peer Mentors are required to carry out the following:

- Register for the Spring 2025 section of HONS 3392-02: Honors Peer Mentorship Seminar (2 Honors credits). Note: This class is designed to be meaningful, not menial. The majority of you grade is determined by showing up and participating in discussion.
- Provide a cumulative total of 40 hours of mentoring (about an hour a week)—from March 30, 2025 to December 15, 2025



- Attend monthly meetings from May 2025 to October 2025 (Over the summer these are held via Zoom)
- Attend the 2025 Honors Student Induction Ceremony on Thursday, August 21 and the Honors "Welcome Back" Tailgate on Friday, August 22

Applications must be submitted by 11:59 p.m. MST on October 4, 2024 to be considered. Applicants who are selected as UHP Peer Mentors will be informed no later than the week of October 28 in order to have time to register for HONS 3392-02: Honors Peer Mentorship.



A couple weeks after the Fall semester started, Brady asked Dr. Pope if there were any new jobs or internships available in the department. Brady said, "He was very quick to hire me."

Brady is now working in the <u>Nuclear Engineering Lab</u> that houses one of the three operable AGN-201 nuclear reactors within the United States. "I am working in the reactor lab rooms, and I even get to go in the reactor room that holds the reactor to study its operations," said Brady, "Some of my duties include organizing some of the reading material in the lab, watching the reactor operators work the reactor, and fulfilling tasks for Dr. Pope to

gain information on other reactors." Brady is looking for resources on reactors that other universities have, such as TRIGA reactors, Plate Fuel reactors, and other AGN reactors. "This helps me to learn about other reactors in use, which I could be working with someday."

When Brady is ready to take a break and relax, he picks up his guitar. "Right now I am really into listening to some of my favorite artists - Tyler Childers, John R. Miller, and Zach Top - and learning some of their songs on the guitar."

Election day is Tuesday, November 5, 2024 and the results are guaranteed to have an impact on your future. This is the second piece of a <u>nonpartisan</u> informative series on voting in the upcoming 2024 general election.

WHAT'S ON THE BALLOT?

The November 5, 2024 election is a nationwide general election. This means that there will be multiple nationwide and local races and propositions on the ballot. This is the election that will have the most impact on your future, no matter who you are and where you live.

Most General Election ballots include races for:

- US President
- US Congress
- State Legislators
- State Initiatives & Amendments
- Local Taxing Districts & Measures

Sample Ballots are available (often online), but sometimes not until October. For example, the Bannock County ballot will be available in October at <u>www.bannockcounty.us/elections/</u>

There are many trustworthy nonprofit, nonpartisan online resources dedicated to providing election information. Here are two of the best:





Have you registered to Vote yet?

If you haven't registered to vote yet, there's still time and it's not hard to do. Be aware that rules and deadlines vary greatly state-to-state, but most require some form of proof of residence. Your driver's license is the best place to start.


VOTE.GOV has everything you need to know about registering to vote. You can

- check to see if you are already registered
- find out more about <u>voting as a college student</u> and making the decision to be registered in your hometown or Pocatello.

If you're an Idaho resident, you can register online (deadline is Friday, October 11).

If you're not an official Idaho resident, you can enter <u>your home state</u> and find all the details you need to know about registering.

<u>Voting by mail</u> (absentee and early voting) may be an option for you. State laws and deadlines vary greatly, so check to see if it's available in your home state.
