

# I DID A THING! I Got Involved!



Logan Bowman '25 puts a lot of time and work into combining their passions and academic goals. They're a McNair scholar pursuing an Honors BA in History with a Political Science minor. and they currently serve as President of Phi Alpha Theta (History Club) and Vice President of the Sexuality and Gender Alliance (SAGA). Last year, Logan took classes from Dr. Kammerer, a professor in the Political Science department. They took LGBTQ Issues in Public Policy class, as well as his Law on Stage Honors Seminar. Logan says, "Both were great classes that I would definitely recommend!" Dr. Kammerer was impressed by Logan and recognized their club leadership roles. He asked if they would be interested in participating in the event planning committee for the LGBT+ History Month in October. Logan said yes!, "A lot of my interests relate to gueer history and culture. I hope to continue to study these topics even after graduating from ISU. It's also helpful to get experience planning events, especially in a relevant field."

Logan is making the most of their position on the event planning committee, not just for themself, but also for the clubs and department they represent. They explain, "I was in charge of room reservations and also registering the events with Leadership & Engagement so that my clubs can get funding through these events. I also helped ensure that the History Department was more directly involved, because it is LGBT+ history month, after all."

There are several great LGBT+ History Month events planned for October, but Logan is looking forward to a specific event that relates directly to their Honors thesis project. "The event that I'm personally most excited about is a documentary screening of <a href="https://documentary.org/">The Lavender Scare</a>. This will be followed by a discussion with myself and Honors Director, Dr. Robey, and we would love to see some Honors students in the audience!" Other events include an art show, additional film screenings, a trivia night, and more.

By getting involved in student clubs and taking on leadership positions, Logan has taken advantage of opportunities that expand their skill set and experiences. When Logan begins applying to graduate schools, they will be a competitive applicant with a wealth of knowledge and experience.

To vote, completely fill in the oval ( ) next to the candidate or measure of your choice with black or blue pen. Write-ins are allowed when there is a qualified write-in candidate. Fill in the oval next to "Write-in" space and print the full name of the candidate.



If you make a mistake, request a new ballot from an election worker.

Because the majority of Honors students are Idaho residents, we are going to focus on the Idaho voting information and ballot measures.

voteidaho.gov is THE BEST resource. There you can:

- register to vote online (deadline is Oct 11);
- view sample ballots,
- request an absentee ballot (this is best for students who's hometown is not Pocatello/Chubbuck, deadline is Oct 25),
- find your voting location
- learn about state and local ballot measures like supplemental levies, initiatives, and propositions

There are also <u>2024 Idaho Voter Pamphlet</u> resources which includes a description of state initiatives with pro and con statements.

# Your Vote Counts Most In Local and State Elections and Ballot Measures

You may have heard that your vote for President doesn't count if you live in Idaho because Idaho is a red state and the Republican candidate always wins. Even if that's true, it's even more true that your vote counts most when you vote in local and state level ballot measures.

This year there are two important state ballot measures up for vote:
Proposed Idaho Constitutional Amendment: HJR 5
Proposition 1: Idaho Open Primaries Act

### **HJR 5 - Amendment to Idaho Constitution**

"Shall Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to provide that individuals who are not citizens of the United States may not be qualified electors in any election held within the state of Idaho?"

<u>Currently</u>, Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Idaho provides: "[e]very male or female citizen of the United States, eighteen years old, who has resided in this state, and in the county where he or she offers to vote for the period provided by law, if registered as provided by law, is a qualified elector."

#### The proposed constitutional amendment provides that:

Only Idaho residents who are citizens of the United States are eligible to vote in elections in the State of Idaho and that noncitizens are not eligible to vote in any election in the State of Idaho.

This provision does not expressly prohibit noncitizens from voting. The proposed amendment adds language to provide that only United States citizens may vote in elections in the State of Idaho.

### **Proposition 1: Idaho Open Primaries Act**

This measure proposes two distinct changes to elections for most public offices.

<u>Under current law</u>, political parties nominate candidates through primary elections in which party members vote for a candidate to represent the party in the general election.

Proposed change #1:

Replace voter selection of party nominees with a top-four primary:

- This measure would abolish Idaho's <u>party</u> primaries.
- The initiative creates a system where all candidates participate in a top-four primary and voters may vote on all candidates. The top four vote-earners for each office would advance to the general election. Candidates could list any affiliation on the ballot, but would not represent political parties, and need not be associated with the party they name.


<u>Under current law</u>, voters may select one candidate for each office, and the candidate with the most votes wins.

### Proposed change #2

Require a ranked-choice voting system for general elections:

- The measure would require a ranked-choice voting system for the general election. Under the ranked-choice voting system, voters rank candidates on the ballot in order of preference, but need not rank every candidate.
- The votes are counted in successive rounds, and the candidate receiving the fewest votes in each round is eliminated. A vote for an eliminated candidate will transfer to the voter's next-highest-ranked active candidate. The candidate with the most votes in the final round wins.
