
#### **Sustainability Student Fund Grant**

- Determine your state of residence. This is not automatically Idaho, just because you are currently living in Idaho. Your driver's license is a good starting point.
- Got to <u>vote.gov</u>, enter your state of residence and check to see if you are already registered. If Idaho is your state of residence, go to <u>voteidaho.gov</u>.
- 3. If you're not registered, get registered!
- 4. If you currently don't live in your place of residence, request an absentee (by mail) ballot from your state. Deadlines vary by state (Idaho deadline is Oct 25)
- 5. Preview your sample ballot. You can get it from your state election website or got to <a href="https://www.vourstate.election.org/ballot">wote411.org/ballot</a>
- 6. Learn about your state and local ballot measures (e.g., initiatives, propositions, amendments, bonds and levys)

#### **Bonds and Levies**

Bonds and Levies are ways for entities to ask for additional funding from taxpayers, typically homeowners, for building projects (bonds) and maintenance and operations (levy).

School districts most often making bond and levy requests, but cities will sometimes ask for funding for public structures such as sports arenas and performing art centers.

The example to the right is from the <u>Bannock County sample</u> <u>ballot</u> for Pocatello/Chubbuck School District 25. It's hard to read and doesn't explain much, so check out the document on the next page.

### FACTS & INFORMATION



The Supplemental Levy is a renewable, voter-approved levy that helps Idaho school districts cover local operating costs. For the 2023-2024 school year, the supplemental levy funded about 7% of PCSD 25's operating costs, supporting high-quality education and services for nearly 12,000 students in the Pocatello/Chubbuck School District 25.

# PROPOSED LEVY

- **✓** If passed, the Supplemental Levy will renew \$8.25 million in funding per year for two years.
- The levy amount requested by PCSD 25 remains unchanged from the last renewal, maintaining the current level of funding for educational services.
- If passed, PCSD 25 will receive a fixed amount of funding as approved, regardless of any increases or decreases in property values across Bannock County.

# Supplemental Levy funds will be allocated each year as follows to maintain PCSD 25's educational services:



Salaries and benefits to recruit and retain qualified teachers, paraprofessionals, administrators, and support staff to maintain class sizes. \$4,725,000



**Textbooks & supplies** for access to up-to-date instructional materials that support learning and align with curriculum standards. \$925,000



Instructional technology software & staffing to support curriculum, including training and support for teachers and learners.
\$750,000



Extracurricular transportation/ travel expenses for participation in events and competitions beyond the local area.

\$600,000



**Custodial Services** to maintain safe and clean schools. **\$575,000** 



Extracurricular salaries for qualified staff to provide learning opportunities outside of the classroom. \$475,000



School Resource Officers to maintain safe and secure public schools. \$200,000

# LOCAL SUPPORT FOR LOCAL LEARNERS

PCSD 25 uses a supplemental levy to bridge the gap between state/federal funding and local needs. Despite increased state funding, nearly 80% of Idaho's school districts rely on supplemental levies to operate.

# APPROXIMATE COST TO HOMEOWNERS

If passed, the Supplemental Levy will renew \$8.25 million in funding per year for two years. The estimated annual cost to taxpayers reflects the total per \$100,000 taxable value based on the estimated levy rate.




The top four candidates advance to the general election

#### **Instant Runoff Voting**



To make sure the winner enjoys support from a broad coalition of voters

The last-place candidate is eliminated. If you ranked that candidate first, your vote will count for your next choice instead. This process repeats until only two candidates remain
